


Police and Crime Plan for Norfolk 2014 - 2016

What we are going to do to keep Norfolk safe



Hello. I am Norfolk's Police and Crime Commissioner.

Stephen Bett is Norfolk's Police and Crime Commissioner.

This document tells you a little bit about Stephen's plan for keeping Norfolk safe.

What does Stephen do?



Tell me what problem you've had

Stephen talks to people in Norfolk to find out about the crime and policing problems that worry them.



Stephen gets money from the Government.



Stephen uses the money to fund policing and projects which help people feel safer.



Tell me how you have spent the money

He asks police and other organisations, like councils, health services and charities, to work together and use the money to stop crime and help victims.

Stephen then checks on the work that is done.

What has Stephen asked police and other organisations to do?



People in Norfolk told Stephen about the crime and policing problems that worry them.

I am worried about people taking my car

Stephen has asked the police and other organisations to try to help by doing these things:



Reduce crime and anti-social behaviour

Anti-social behaviour is behaviour which may make you feel upset or frightened, like lots of loud noise from your neighbours or people being drunk on the streets.



Stop reoffending

Reoffending is where people do crimes again and again.



Make sure victims and witnesses of crime get the help they need

Victims are people who have crimes done against them.

Witnesses are people who see crimes being done to others.



Make sure people feel safe in their community and everyone is treated fairly

Being treated fairly can mean being treated the same as everyone else or in a way which meets your needs.

What else has he asked them to do?



What I need you to do is....



Work together

Stephen wants everyone to work together to help with people's problems



If everyone works together and people get the right kind of help, then they will only call the police when they really need them.



Stop domestic abuse and sexual abuse

Stephen wants more people to understand what domestic abuse and sexual abuse are, and he wants more of these crimes to be solved.

Domestic abuse is when someone is hurt or treated badly by someone they know, like their partner or carer.



Sexual abuse is when someone is made to have sex or is touched in a way they don't like.

He also wants victims and their families to get more help, and he's asked police and other organisations to try to stop cases of domestic abuse and sexual abuse by working with the people who do these crimes.

Help with mental health



The police get a lot of calls from people with mental health issues but often the police are not the best people to help them.

Stephen wants police and other organisations to work better together to support people with mental health issues. He wants them to do more to stop things getting so bad that people feel they need to contact the police.



Help people stop taking drugs and alcohol

Having a problem with drugs or alcohol can sometimes make someone commit crime.

Stephen wants more help for these people so there is less crime in Norfolk.



Help people to stop doing crime

People who commit crime again and again sometimes have other problems that make them do that, like nowhere to live or no job.

Stephen wants more help and information so they can make good changes to their lives, find homes or jobs and stop committing crime.
